Landline telephone service requires the homeowner's verbal agreement to remove any optional telephone features. 	<p style="text-align: center;"><u>Community Supervision Phase</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • In person contact with PSO • Drug testing at least once per week • Electronically monitored curfew from 10pm-6am • Cellular technology available for certain defendants with verified addresses but no landline phone • Placement into drug treatment after assessment of defendants referred by the Court or who repeatedly test positive • Social service referrals • Make appropriate supervision or discharge recommendations when defendants violate release conditions • Notify the Court of violations on a weekly basis. <p style="text-align: center;"><u>Home Confinement Phase</u></p> <p>Defendants are subject to electronically monitored home confinement for 21 days. Defendants are allowed to leave their residences only for verified education or employment, to report to PSA in person, for drug testing, or other pre-approved purposes. The Court is notified of violations after each infraction while the defendant remains on the home confinement phase. Defendants are returned to electronically monitored curfew (community supervision phase) once successfully completing the assigned days of home confinement.</p>	<p><u>Sanctions</u></p> <p>Responses to infractions include the following sanctions:</p> <p style="text-align: center;"><u>Community Supervision Phase</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Modification of curfew hours to 8:00pm to 6:00am • 7 days of home confinement • If the infraction is a 2nd drug testing infraction, testing is increased to twice weekly and a substance abuse assessment is required. If treatment is deemed necessary, participation in drug treatment is required. • 14 days of home confinement • 21 days of home confinement • Subsequent infractions result in the defendant staying in home confinement until the next court hearing. <p style="text-align: center;"><u>Home Confinement Phase</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • 7 additional days of home confinement • 14 additional days of home confinement • If the infraction is a 2nd drug testing infraction, drug testing is increased to twice weekly and a substance abuse assessment is required. If treatment is deemed necessary, participation in drug treatment is required. • 21 additional days of home confinement and a report is forwarded to the Court requesting removal from PSA supervision. The defendant will remain on home confinement until a hearing is held. <p><u>Incentives</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Placement into the community phase of the program (10pm-6am curfew from home confinement) • Decrease in eligible defendant's drug testing requirements if drug test results are negative. 	<p style="text-align: center;">PSA will provide release orders for HISP conditions.</p> <p>All defendants must be screened by PSA.</p> <p>An attorney may recommend HISP placement and the Attorney Referral Form may be obtained through PSA and must be received at least 5 days prior to the defendant's next court hearing.</p> <p style="text-align: center;">PSO must be present in court for HISP placement.</p> <p>Defendants are instructed to report to PSA's Release Services Unit for a post release interview and directions to the HISP office for orientation. Orientations are conducted twice daily at 10:00am and 3:00pm.</p>

Jail.</p> <p>No significant mental health issues.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Attempt to keep defendants in compliance with release conditions; • Notify the Court of violations of release conditions; • Consult with DOC concerning halfway house compliance; • Coordinate social services with DOC; • Screen defendants to determine eligibility for placement in High Intensity Supervision Program, Supervised Pretrial Release with Global Positioning Monitoring, or Specialized Supervision Unit (mental health); and • If drug testing is ordered by the court, monitor drug test results and provide appropriate referrals for assessment and/or treatment. 	<p><u>Positive Drug Test Results (if court-ordered)</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Warning • Warning with discussion of treatment • Referred for assessment and possible placement in treatment <p><u>Failure to Contact PSA as directed (if court-ordered)</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Warning • Restricted movement from halfway house • Recommend revocation 	<p style="text-align: center;">As ordered by the Court.</p>
